n September 8th, 2000, University of Michigan Athletic Director Bill Martin announced the formation of a tiered club sports system. Teams that meet certain criteria may apply for "varsity-club" status.

This new tier provides additional recourses for club sport teams that behave more like varsity teams in terms of competition level, budget, and organization.

These varsity-club teams are primarily self-funded through dues and fundraisers. The University of Michigan Department of Recreational Sports will continue to administer over club varsity teams as it does other club teams.

Varsity-club teams are staffed by full-time coaches and compete against national competition. Each year, all club sports are able to apply for club varsity status.



Promotion into the club varsity tier is reliant on criteria associated with budget, coaching, scheduling, practice time, and student-athlete eligibility.

Varsity-club teams do not offer athletic scholarships and are comprised entirely of "walk-on" athletes. Each team holds annual tryouts in the fall.

Varsity-club athletes have access to similar training and academic support as varsity athlete. Varsity-club teams practice and compete in the same facilities used by the varsity teams. Additionally, the Ross Academic Center is open to varsity-club athletes.



# 2009 SEASON REVIEW

### **Big Ten Tournament**

Returning home, the Wolverines (4-2) hosted the inaugural Big Ten Tournament. All ten conference schools that offer women's club lacrosse teams traveled to Ann Arbor to participate in the tournament.

Oosterbaan Fieldhouse would play host to 16 games over the three day tournament while their four opponents, winning by a combined score of 58-14. Michigan was so dominant that Amy Johnson nearly outscored all of U-M's opponents combined, netting 13 goals herself over the four games.



With the outcomes never in doubt, the Michigan coaching staff used the four games as a live practice for the team to work on new plays and techniques. Second halves were used to practice shooting low on the goalie. Players who shot high were pulled from the games even if they scored.

Players practiced trick shots highlighed by a behind-the-back goal from the stick of Johnson.

Michigan blew past Ohio State to open the tournament on Friday night by a score of 14-7.

The game marked a milestone for Michigan Women's Lacrosse as it was broadcast live on WCBN FM 88.3 in Ann Arbor and online at wcbn.org. The online broadcast drew over 275 listeners with another 500 estimated to have tuned in on the radio.

The second day of the tournament pitted U-M against Penn State and Wisconsin with the Wolverines winning 18-4 and 16-2 respectively.

Michigan made short work of Michigan then shut down Northwestern 10-1 to close out the tournament undefeated. The four Michigan games drew nearly 1,000 listeners over the weekend.

### Michigan @ Oakland University

On a cold and dreary night, Michigan (8-2) took care of business, defeating Oakland University (0-1) by a score of 13-5 at All-American Lacrosse in Pontiac, MI. Delaney Kempner, Rachel Lary and Julie Baskind all scored two goals to lead the team.

As the snow melted, the competition heated up on Saturday with Michigan facing a pair of ranked teams in #10 BYU and #7 Colorado State.

After earning a hard-fought 8-5 victory over BYU, the Wolverines suffered their third loss of a season, falling to the defending national champion and tournament host, Colorado State 9-7.

All of Michigan's losses last season came by two goals or fewer and to teams ranked No. 2, No. 3, and No. 7 in the country. The team closed out the weekend defeating #18 Minnesota 10-2 on Sunday morning before heading back to Ann Arbor.



### Michigan @ Calvin

Despite missing eight players due to injury, academic, or religious commitments, Michigan (15-3) blew past Calvin College (7-5) 18-3.

The team bus pulled up to the field just three minutes before the 7:00 PM scheduled start time but the Wolverines needed little time to warm up, taking the lead just one minute into the game on Amy Santoriello's eighth goal of the season.



Emmy Scheidt kept the lead intact, turning aside consecutive eightmeter shots within a one minute span.

The action stayed in the Michigan offensive zone for the remainder of the half with the Wolverines jumping out to an 8-0 lead before the Knights pushed across their first goal at the 5:15 mark.

Calvin would score again with 1:16 to go in the half, cutting the Michigan lead to 8-2 at the break.

Britt Boehm got the second half scoring started off the opening draw, finding the net just :37 into the second stanza.

Amy Johnson added her third goal of the game to put Michigan into double-digit scoring for the 11th time this season. Michigan is undefeated when scoring ten or more goals.

Johnson added two more goals in the half, tying her career-high with five goals on the evening. The Wolverines never took their foot off the pedal, scoring six times in the final eight minutes, including two goals in the last :25 to make the final score 18-3.

While it may be hard to stay focused once the outcome is determined, Michigan takes advantage of the opportunity to practice against a live opponent.

"We regroup after every goal and decide what we want to accomplish in offensively before we score again," said senior quad-captain, Julie Baskind. "We set up scenarios for ourselves to mimic the competition we will face at Nationals."

### **WCLL Conference Tournament**

#6 Michigan (17-4) entered the WCLL Conference Tournament in Toledo, Ohio as the top seed, opening the tournament with a 23-2 trouncing of Marquette. Delaney Kempner, Ashley Felber, and Amy Johnson all scored hat-tricks.

Thirteen different players scored goals during the game for Michigan. That stat becomes especially impressive considering the Wolverines only have 15 different players that play attack or midfield.

Next up for U-M was Pittsburgh which put up more of a fight before the Wolverines pushed past 12-6.

Amy Johnson led Michigan with four goals in the contest. With the victory, Michigan advanced to the finals where they would play #10 Lindenwood University.

With an automatic bid to nationals on the line, Lindenwood upset Michigan, winning 10-8.

With the loss, Michigan had to return home and await the selection committee's decision on their post season fate.

After the eight conferences award automatic bids to their league champions, the committee selects eight more teams for at-large bids.

Fortunately the committee awarded the Wolverines a bid so the season would continue in Scottsdale, Ariz. May 6-9.

# Round One: #8 Michigan 17 #9 UCLA 13

Despite the intense 100+ degree heat, eighth-seeded Michigan (18-4) kept its cool, overcoming a three goal deficit in the second half to earn the 17-13 victory over ninth-seeded UCLA (10-8).

Julie Baskind, Jess Stanley, and Amy Johnson registered hat-tricks to lead the Wolverine scoring charge.

Senior quad-captain Micaela Battiste started off the scoring, finding the net 1:25 into the game. UCLA then answered with back-to-back goals, taking a 2-1 lead.

Stanley followed by bouncing home her first goal of the contest off an eight-meter shot, knotting the score at 2-2.

The two teams traded goals until Michigan opened up an 8-6 advantage on a bounce shot from Johnson assisted by Ani Shekerjian.

UCLA closed out the first half scoring consecutive goals to send the game into the intermission tied at 8-8. The Bruins would pick up right where they left off, scoring three unanswered goals to build an 11-8 lead.

Trailing by three, many teams might have panicked and lost focus but not Michigan, said assistant coach, Kasey Hughes.

"We kept our composure and never got panicky during the UCLA run. We played solidly the whole game."

Baskind proved to be the spark for Michigan again, ending the UCLA run with a marker at 23:13, cutting the U-M deficit to two.

Rachel Lary added a goal three minutes later to make it a one goal game. UCLA responded with another tally to lead 12-10 before Michigan went on a run of their own.



"It's a long game and being down by three goals with a full half to go can't stop you. We knew we had to keep it up," said Baskind after the game.

Along with the three hat-tricks, Alexis Pavle and Lary added multigoal efforts.

The Wolverine defense stepped it up to seal the victory, holding the powerful UCLA offense goalless over the final twelve minutes.

Emmy Schedit made several key saves down the stretch and fellow freshman, Kelsey Martin



intercepted a Bruin pass in the crease, leading to a Michigan goal on the other end to ice the win.

### Round 2: #8 Michigan 8 #1 UCSB 9

In a game that seesawed back and forth, #8 Michigan (18-5) came up one goal short in the end, falling 9-8 to #1 University of California Santa Barbara (20-2).

After a scoreless five minutes, the Wolverines jumped ahead 1-0 when Birtt Boehm found a cutting Rachel Lary who lifted a shot over the UCSB goalkeeper.

The two teams would trade goals until the 4:31 mark in the first half when UCSB was able to open up a two goal margin, scoring with 0:20 left in the half.

Many teams may have let up with short time remaining before the intermission, but not these Wolverines.

Julie Baskind scored less than a minute into the second half tying the game at five.


Johnson followed with her second goal of the game just 0:44 later to give Michigan the one goal lead.

Scheidt finished the game with a career-best 23 saves and even managed to pick up one groundball.

"I enjoy the pressure of playing the best teams," said Scheidt after the game. "These games have all been so close so it's a lot easier to stay involved in the game."



With the Wolverine advantage down to one goal, freshman attacker Delaney Kempner entered the game for the first time all weekend.

Kempner immediately drew a foul and converted the ensuing eightmeter, shooting high to beat the Cal Poly goalie and giving Michigan the 9-7 lead.

"Our bench is always involved in the game, cheering on our teammates," Kempner said.

"It wasn't hard to adjust to being in the game at a pivotal moment."

Stanley added her fourth goal of the game at the 4:00 mark to seal the victory for Michigan.

Cal Poly would add one last tally at the 1:50 mark to cut the Wolverine lead to 10-8 but Lary won the draw and Michigan's offense was able to keep possession until time expired.

### Round 4: #8 Michigan 11 #2 UC Santa Clara 7

For the second game in a row, #8 Michigan (20-5) led from start to finish, earning fifth place with an 11-7 victory over #2 UC Santa Clara.

Julie Baskind got the scoring started for the Wolverines, finding the back of the net on half. an eight-meter shot just over one minute into the game. She'd

Under her eye last season, Michigan allowed fewer than six goals per game and freshman goalie Emmy Scheidt received first-team All-Tournament honors at Nationals. Hughes attended Washington & Lee University in Lexington, Virginia, where she was an eight-time varsity letterwinner (soccer & lacrosse) and served as team captain for both. The Generals' defense finished the 1998 lacrosse season with an eighth-ranked 7.33 Goals Against Average, as Hughes lead the way with a .667 save percentage in goal.

Hughes was an All-ODAC Conference Academic Award winner, W&L scholar-athlete, and also made the W&L Dean's list and honor roll. Ginny also holds the Washington & Lee Women's Lacrosse school record for most saves in a season (210).



Michigan athletic teams have claimed 52 national championships in 12 sports over the years, beginning with football's 1901 national title. Since then, Wolverine dynasties have developed in football, men's swimming and diving and ice hockey. In fact, no other NCAA Division I program boasts more national titles in hockey or men's swimming and diving. In 2005, Michigan softball captured the nation's attention winning its first Women's College World Series, becoming the first school east of the Mississippi to do so.

Michigan student-athletes have accumulated 278 NCAA titles dating back to 1922. Since 2000, Wolverines have combined for 37 national titles in men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's track and field, men's and women's gymnastics, rowing and wrestling.







#### MARY SUE COLEMAN PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN

Mary Sue Coleman is in her seventh year as the 13th president of the University of Michigan. As president, she has unveiled several major initiatives that will have an impact on future generations of students, the intellectual life of the campus, and society at large. These initiatives include the interdisciplinary richness of the U-M, student residential life, ethics in our society, and issues related to health care.

Under her leadership, the University launched "The Michigan Difference" campaign for the future of the institution, which surpassed its goal of \$2.5 billion in May 2007. The campaign continues through to its December 2008 deadline, with an emphasis on scholarships and fellowships for students, endowed chairs for faculty and other unmet needs.

Dr. Coleman also has announced a groundbreaking partnership between the University and Google, which will enable the public to search the text of the University's seven million-volume library and will open the way to universal access and the preservation of recorded human knowledge.

President Coleman is regarded as a national spokesperson on the educational value of diverse perspectives in the classroom. Her extensive leadership in higher education includes having served on the Association of American Universities Executive Committee, the Internet2 Board of Directors, the National Collegiate Athletic Association Board of Directors and the Knight Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics. Elected to the Institute of Medicine in 1997, President Coleman also is a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

For 19 years she was a member of the University of Kentucky's biochemistry faculty. Her work led to administrative appointments at the University of North Carolina and the University of New Mexico, where she served as provost and vice president for academic affairs. From 1995-2002, Dr. Coleman was president of the University of Iowa.

At the University, she holds appointments of professor of biological chemistry in the Medical School and professor of chemistry in the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts. She earned her undergraduate degree in

chemistry from Grinnell College and her doctorate in biochemistry from the University of North Carolina.

President Coleman and her husband, Dr. Kenneth Coleman, a political scientist specializing in Latin America, live in the historic President's House on campus. Their son, Jonathan, is a portfolio manager in Denver, Colo.



The \$12 million, 38,000 square foot facility, located on State Street between Yost Ice Arena and the Marie Hartwig Building, provides computer labs, tutorial meeting rooms, assembly areas for group projects, and offices for instructional staff.



WEIGHT TRAINING & CONDITIONING Michigan is unique among universities in that its program maximizes the student-athletes' time as well as their results. Individualized programs determine proper training and nutritional needs for peak performances. Facilities are located in Crisler Arena, Canham Natatorium, Schembechler Hall and Yost Ice Arena.

ATHLETIC MEDICINE Michigan's staff, among the nation's largest and most comprehensive, is dedicated to the prevention, treatment and rehabilitation of injuries sustained by U-M varsity athletes. The staff is comprised of 13 certified athletic trainers, 40 student trainers, a nutritionist, counselors and five team physicians. The esteemed University of Michigan Hospital system provides the most advanced medical diagnostic testing and treatment resources available. U-M has nine satellite athletic training rooms, including two full-service facilities in Canham Natatorium and Schembechler Hall.




